ANGELS AT EASTER

The Gospel for the Easter Vigil this year is from Luke. In his account, the women who come to the tomb encounter "two men" (Luke 24:4). Who are these men, and why are they there? The short answer is that they are angels. But if that is the case, why does Luke identify them as "two men"? Luke is simply following normal biblical practice. There is no single word in the Bible that identifies an angel. Instead, there are a variety of terms that refer to beings of heavenly status who are distinct from God and humans. Angels can be called "sons of God" (Job 38:7), "the holy ones" (Ps 89:6-8), "watchers" (Dan 4:10), and even "gods" (Ps 82:1). The most common word to designate an angel is "messenger." The Hebrew word for messenger is malak. The Greek equivalent is aggelos, from which we derive the English word "angel." Yet in many biblical passages angels are described as "men." This is the case of the "three men" who visit Abraham (Gen 18:2) and the "man" who wrestles with Jacob at the Jabbok River (Gen 32:25). In such passages we can only detect the presence of an angel from the context or by the way the characters act.

This is true of the "two men" Luke places at the empty tomb. He could have called them angels (messengers), but he does not have to do so. We know they are heavenly messengers by what they do. They announce Jesus' resurrection. The women certainly recognize the "two men" as angels. The two disciples on the road to Emmaus reveal this as they speak to Jesus. They say that the women of their company who were at the tomb "came back and reported they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive" (Luke 24:23).

Just as the "two men" in Luke are angels, the same is true of the "young man" Mark places in his account of the empty tomb (Mark 16:5). Matthew and John are more specific. Matthew speaks of "an angel of the Lord" (28:2). John has "two angels" address Mary of Magdala (20:12). The Gospel writers agree that angelic messengers were present at the empty tomb, even though they do not always identify them as such.

Most of us prefer charity. The ambiguous way the Bible presents angels can, therefore, unsettle us. Yet there is a spiritual message to be found in such vagueness. None of us encounter God face-to-face. Our relationship is always mediated through created realities Whether it be through an angel, another human, an experience of nature, or the impact of a significant event our contact with God is indirect. Nor is God tied to one manifestation. God can speak to us in the face of a stranger, the support of a friend, the magnificence of a sunset. We might expect God to speak to us at church or during private prayer. But God is just as likely to meet us at the supermarket, on the soccer field, or as we doze on the backyard patio.

Like angels, God comes to us in diverse ways. It is our honor to welcome the encounter.
