BY WHAT SPIRIT?

The Gospels are full of stories of Jesus confronting and besting evil spirits. Modern psychology assumes that behavior comes from inner motives and ways of thinking and feeling. With due consideration for the power of past experiences and memories, we tend to consider the forces behind our actions as arising from within the person. Much ancient Mediterranean psychology believed these forces were personified spirits (in Greek, *diamones*) who came from outside to enter and inhabit the person, sometimes by invitation, sometimes involuntarily.

It is a mistranslation to see all these spirits as evil, as *demons* (e.g., in 1 Cor 10:20-21). Some of them were benevolent and beneficial ones could prompt positive attitudes and behavior, for example, the list of "fruits of the Spirit" that Paul lays out in Galatians 5:22. The malevolent ones could prompt not only bad behavior but physical and mental disease. Thus in the Gospel narratives, there is a fine line between exorcism and healing. In the case of exorcisms, the question is sometimes posed: does this person derive his power from the spirit of God or the spirit of evil (see Mark 3: 22-30)? This is fundamentally where the "discernment of spirits," a process with a long history, begins.

The spirit inhabiting the man in Mark 5:1-20 (Monday) is "unclean" and clearly malevolent, producing in him behavior that we would call severe mental illness, including self-mutilation. Narrative details enhance the drama. The setting is the "other side" of the lake, thought by the Jews of Galilee to be strange and contaminated territory. Jesus no sooner has a leg out of the boat than he is vehemently accosted by the unclean spirit inhabiting this unfortunate man. The possessing spirit recognizes Jesus for who he is—and wants him to go away. Jesus, however, draws on his own authority and commands the spirit to leave the man. He invokes the power of naming, the first step to asserting control. The possessing spirit turns out to be not one but many and has a name that it/they admit: *legion*. The appearance of this Latin word in the Greek text is odd. It may just be a loanword incorporated into the Greek of Mark's milieu to mean "many". But commentators often think it is a swipe at the Roman army, organized in legions, a jab appropriate to Mark's context, which may be even Rome itself.

The ultimate swipe, however, is where the now-homeless unclean spirits are willing to go: into a herd of pigs! The pigs, like the formerly possessed man, are driven to irrational and self-destructive behavior and commit suicide. We can almost hear the Jewish listeners to the story say, *Of course, where else? They had it coming! Good riddance!* The bad news is that spirits don't die when their hosts do, so they will be free to go bother someone else—but not is Jesus has anything to say about it.

We will miss the point of this story if we get sidetracked into animal rights or economic justice for the pig herders. The narrative is meant to convey in sweeping terms the power of Jesus over evil spirits. We must keep in mind, however, that Jesus is not "spiritless." He too is possessed—by the ultimate good spirit, the one we call the Holy Spirit. We have already been told this at the beginning of the story, when this Spirit descends upon Jesus at baptism and then *drives* (not *leads*) him into the wilderness (Mark 1:10-12). Jesus knows by what Spirit he is possessed—the one that can be trusted to bring about the kingdom of God, and whom we invoke in prayer: "Come, Holy Spirit!"
