Thinking to Speak

Gn 2:7-9; 3:1-7 / Ps 51:3-4, 5-6, 12-13, 17 / Rom 5:12-19 / Mt 4:1-11


"O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth shall proclaim your praise." When we speak, our words have power. They can build up and they can tear down. A nation can be built upon words, and a war can be started with words. We need to be good stewards of our words. Words can forgive, heal and rescue. But words come after our thoughts. There is a quote, "watch your thoughts, they become your words; watch your words, they become your actions; watch your actions, they become your habits; watch your habits, they become your character, watch your character, it becomes your destiny." We are stewards of our thoughts. We need to fill our thoughts with truth, beauty and goodness. The world, the flesh and the devil seek the opposite. Put on the mind of Christ, and our thoughts will prepare our words to give praise!

REMEMBERING BENEDICT XVI PT. 2

Last week, we sketched the life of Joseph Ratzinger & his struggles with the Nazis in his youth. In 1951, He was ordained a priest & assigned to Bavaria, Germany where he loved his life, the people & the peace there. His contemporary, Karol Wojtyla of Poland endured the same abuse in his country, only it was the emerging Communist Party. Fr. Ratzinger wrote often and pointedly of Europe and its relations with the Church. His words came to the attention of Rome and Pope Paul VI in 1977 made him Archbishop of Munich, Germany. Three months later, he was elevated to a Cardinal. Pope Paul died in 1978 and the conclave of Cardinals chose Polish Cardinal Karol Wojtyla as the new Pope. He took the name of John Paul II. The new pope appointed Cardinal Ratzinger to become the head of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith. Cardinal Ratzinger never left Rome again after that move. Through the years, John Paul II and Ratzinger became close friends as their philosophies on the direction of the Church were similar. In 2005, John Paul died and Cardinal Ratzinger was elected Pope. He took the name Benedict XVI. He was a humble man and his first prayer as Pope was 'to ask the people for prayers to help him love the Lord more each day.' He was 75 and elected to a position that he would have rather not had'.

Benedict's life was grounded in an actual, living person--Jesus. He often said, "Our faith is not a doctrine or a philosophy. Our faith is in a person, Jesus Christ. This may explain Benedict's strong reverence for the Mass. He saw each Mass as an encounter with Christ. He was often misrepresented by others because our world seems to misunderstand motive and truth. Many questioned his fast rise within the Vatican. What was his motive? The truth was--there was no motive for he would have much rather remained in Bavaria with his small flock and have time to write about the Church and teach the people the meanings of the Gospel. Benedict was a gentle soul with a brilliant mind who loved writing more than wearing the Pope's hat with all of its obligations. He was also an obedient man and when chosen by his peers to be the next Pope, he humbly accepted the position. He didn't make the papacy about 'him'. He believed the Catholic faith was good news for all people. As a result, he was generous with inviting people to greater communion with the Church. He also was quick to recognize the legitimacy of diverse expressions of the same faith. As he said, "If we're secure in the unchanging truths of our faith, we don't have to feel threatened by legitimate diversity." These newfound ideas brought him controversy among some of the older Church leaders. Next week: Results of new ideas and openness.
