NEAR DEATH EXPERIENCES: HOW SCIENCE WORKS WITH RELIGION

My motive to devote a column to a longtime, confusing subject, near-death-experiences, henceforth to be NDE, took root when I saw and heard Evangelist, Chris Stefanick, interview well-known Catholic priest, Father Robert Spitzer, of EWTN. He's a strong believer that science supports religion in amazing ways. His explanation of NDE gives actual proof of their close connection.

A NDE occurs when someone experiences a heart attack or a drowning victim is pulled from water and efforts are made to stimulate breathing. At the time, the brain shows a flatline and, as the responder attempts to bring him back, the victim may experience a NDE as he is declared clinically dead. Yet, Fr. Spitzer emphases, the body can see, hear, and remember. Father says up to 81% of such victims can see during this time. He cited a 16-year-old boy, blind from birth: his spirit went outside of the hospital, right through the wall, the boy recalls. He also remembers seeing a train passing nearby and he described it intricately (much detail). Fr. Spitzer said that apparently, we have visual imagination during this time. We need to keep in mind that, medically, at this stage, there is no activity in the cerebral cortex of the brain, yet this soul sees all these things and records these experiences outside his body! Raymond Moody, author of "Life After Life", states that none of this can be explained unless you believe in a soul. A 2010 survey of scientists showed that 51% of them believed in God, 21% were agnostic (doubting), and 20% were atheists. The younger the scientist, the more likely the belief in God was stronger.

What does one experience in a NDE? Results showed a) most found their bodies elongated (taller) b) 35% went to another world, perhaps heaven, some saw deceased relatives whom they never knew; an 8 yr old girl went through the experience and an older lady greeted her as her grandmother. She told the girl, "Your mother and I had a secret name for your doll, which she told the little girl. The girl was resuscitated and in the course of what occurred, the girl said she met her grandma whom she didn't recognize, but grandma told her of a secret that the two of them kept: the name they gave her doll. The mom was astonished when she heard it! One fellow in his late 50s had a NDE where he met his grandfather. He didn't recognize him, for he was thinking of an older man. After resuscitation, he was shown his grandfather as a man of 35. He quickly told the family, "Yeah, this is the grandpa I remembered!" Fr. Spitzer told his interviewer, Chris Stefonick, "apparently the body we're given may not be the one we died in!" Back to what people experience during NDE: c) a small percentage have dark encounters and d) On the positive side, most NDE convince the individual to lose their fear of death from then on.

Most saw a very bright light possibly meaning an encounter with God while others felt an overwhelming sense of love/ Some, who had suffered terrific pain in their lives reported all pain gone! Fr. Spitzer said the beauty of the Catholic faith is that Jesus gives HOPE. We should go to Hope when we're lonely or sad and these scientific findings should give us Hope--Hope in Jesus's love for us. Those of you who are interested further, can go to U-Tube and type in Fr. Spitzer's name. Father cites many scientific journals in his talk, making the information very credible.
