### THE CATHOLIC CHURCH---GUARDIAN OF HOLY SCRIPTURE

In the 15th Century (1400s), the printing press was invented. Before that, the monks slowly copied the Bible and it took years to get a complete copy. With this newly formed invention, copies became more plentiful. As Europe entered an era of new learning (the French gave it the name, Renaissance), people began to hunger for knowledge. They wanted to know about everything and make decisions independently. The printing press made knowledge more available. Some, inevitably, began to question Church authority. Numerous Biblical translations in all sorts of nationalities were printed and sold to the people. Some of these 'bibles' were actually printed secretly and 'false translations' began to appear. Many were sold to those eager to read and learn for themselves.

When the Church learned officially about these actions, they began to collect all of these 'false translations' to keep them from misleading the people. Most of the translations were hurriedly done and many errors were detected by Church scholars. The Church burned thousands of these 'mistranslated' bibles. Yet, even today, the Church still hears accusations that she burned Bibles, kept Bibles from the people, and doesn't rely on the Bible for basic worship. Personally, I've encountered these accusations many times when discussing religion with other Christians. As any practicing Catholic knows, we use the Bible in many phases of the Mass. As we've said before, the very first Christian Bible was produced by the Church. She has kept the Bible authentic, despite the false translations. It was the Church who set aside those books not considered sacred, and therefore, not belonging to the Holy Scriptures. It is to the Church (Pope and Bishops in Council) and its infallible teaching authority, that we must appeal for proof of the makeup of Holy Scripture and of the fact of its inspiration. She is the custodian of the Word of God and the Bible should be interpreted in the light of her teachings. Even Martin Luther, a leader of the Protestant Revolt, wrote in his COMMENTARY ON ST. JOHN: "We are compelled to concede to the Papists (those loyal to the Pope in this period) that they have the Word of God, that we received it from them, and that without them, we should have no knowledge of it at all."

As recipients of the Church's efforts to preserve the Bible for everyone, we should keep that sacred book handy and use it when life's challenges become too difficult. We either go forward or fall back in life's journey. No one stands still. This is true in the practice of our faith. We should try to grow in the knowledge of Jesus and what He asks of us. Resist the temptation to put your Bible aside. It is a textbook for life. It has a positive effect on teaching us, admonishing us when we need it, for this is how we come to know God. You can't love what you don't know. At your death, you don't want to hear those words from Jesus, "I don't know you." Have your Bible handy and commit to reading a bit of it daily. Soon, you will have read it completely. I found a plan that, if followed, you can finish it in one year. Check with me if you're interested and I'll give it to you. By knowing Jesus, we find happiness in this life and the life to come. We all need that personal, friendly relationship with Jesus, what He said and did, and what he asks of us.
