

# **Understanding the Mass** (by Father Vacca)

#8 The "presider" at a Mass is the priest who prays the three presidential prayers. The Opening Prayer is the first of these prayers. In it, the theme for that Mass is made clear, whether the Mass is for a saint, or a feast, or on a seasonal theme.

The Opening Prayer can be prayed from the altar, or from the presider's chair. That chair is where the presiding priest sits during the Liturgy of the Word. It is possible for the presider to not be the priest consecrating the Eucharist at the altar; we rarely see this except when an elderly Pope or bishop presides over a Mass, but a younger Cardinal or priest does most of the work at the altar.

The presidential prayers are in the Roman Missal which has become a larger and heavier book in recent years. A missal stand is the traditional way to hold the book open for its use without smudging and ruining the binding. They are very expensive books to replace.



## DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME ENDS, DID YOU NOTICE?

The 20th century is said to be the boldest in human history. Airplanes were invented & we took to the sky. A few decades later, the urge to explore the atmosphere dominated scientific thinking & the 1960s saw great advances in space that climaxed with placing a man on the moon in July, 1969. During WW II, we created the atomic bomb with the potential to destroy the world. Toward century's end, we built up our technology to the point that we've placed the entirety of human knowledge at our fingertips and we carry it around on our person daily! It's called a cellphone! We also decided we could outsmart Time by changing our clocks twice a year & adopting a new time known as Daylight Savings Time, hereafter referred to as DST. We've had it for a century now, but most of us don't really understand its workings yet.

DST has many parents since we can point to half a dozen scientists who contributed to its adoption. Benjamin Franklin is credited with the idea for DST when he served as our ambassador to France in the 18th century (1700s). He had noticed that the French slept in, far too long each morning--sometimes until 10:30 a.m. before rising. He wrote an essay suggesting it made better sense to arise earlier and get more work done during daylight hours. He even wrote an essay in satire, explaining his plan. He wanted to add more time to the summer months, saying it would delay nightfall one hour in early spring, which meant they could save candles in the evening with fewer night hours. Few took him seriously and not until WW I did the U.S. instituted it as an emergency war measure to save power & help blackout periods. After the Big War, the idea lapsed & then came WW II when DST was begun again. DST still didn't catch on with the people when WW II ended & the law was repealed. Br. Prime Minister Winston Churchill supported it however. Why was DST reinstituted soon after the War? The national government had dropped it at war's end, but that allowed States & local governments to set their own time & this resulted in chaos. Many time zones were formed & travel brought confusion to those passing through the various zones. In 1966, Pres. Lyndon Johnson signed a bill making DST national and it continues today. We do have a couple of States who do not observe it: Hawaii & Arizona have opted out for various reasons---in Arizona because of its desert climate & Hawaii's distance proves difficult to maintain a time zone. Most of our U.S. territories such as Guam and Puerto Rico have their own time zones. 64% of Americans still support the present time zone system, yet several States have petitioned the federal govt to retain Standard Time permanently. Earlier this year, a couple of House members introduced a bill, the Sunshine Protection Act, to stay on DST permanently, but the bill made no headway. The Senate passed a bill unanimously last year to stay on DST, but the House took no action. Many health experts have said that having one permanent time zone for the nation would contribute to better health. They said that the human body is not designed to reset its internal clock. Any health problem is made worse by poor sleep. Even churches report lower attendance on the Sunday of change. We need one year-round standard for time, many continue to say. The world probably would be better off if Ben had kept his idea to himself!!

On another important matter, this coming Tuesday, Nov. 7, is election day for most school boards and city & county commissions. Many folks ignore these elections, thinking that State & national elections affect the average citizen most. Do not be led to think that local elections are unimportant. On the contrary, the old saying, "all politics is local" is true. We must start by insuring that good, solid, leaders near home administer our schools and also keep our cities & counties running smoothly and efficiently. If you feel unqualified to judge such leaders, check out your local newspapers who run stories that explain their qualifications for the offices. Some may ask why elections are held on the 1st Tues. after the 1st Mon in Nov every two years. In the beginning, States chose their own times for elections. Because this brought much confusion, in 1845, Congress passed a law stating that ALL elections--city, State, & national, would be held on the 1st Tues. after the lst Mon. of Nov of even numbered years. November was chosen because, at that time, the majority of the labor force were farmers & by this time, the harvest was usually over, yet the weather was still mild. Tuesday was chosen for voting so as not to interfere with weekend church services or midweek marketing when farmers sold their crops on street corners in town. Travel was also a factor in this decision due to poor roads. In a democracy, voting is not only a privilege, but a duty. History shows when voting is ignored, a few, hungry for power, manage to take over the government. We've seen it happen in many nations. Exercise your voice in local government this Tuesday. If we don't vote, we lose our right to complain.
