Understanding the Mass (by Father Vacca)

#16 The Nicene Creed we recite at Mass has been used since the 4th century. It serves as a summary of our faith.

If you are ever asked what Catholics believe, simply point to the Creed as a listing of the basic non-negotiable articles of our faith. It was used in baptism rituals as a clear statement of faith for those to be baptized.

We recite it at the end of the Liturgy of the Word because that is when those not yet baptized in olden times would have to leave. The unbaptized were not allowed to be present for the rest of Mass until they had become one in faith with the Christian community.

In the old Mass, the Liturgy of the Word was called the Liturgy of the Catechumens, meaning those not yet baptized could be present. The second half of Mass called the Liturgy of the Eucharist used to be called the Liturgy of the Faithful, so only the faithful could remain. Since we no longer follow those customs of separation, the names of these parts of Mass have changed accordingly.

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
