Understanding the Mass (by Father Vacca)

#19 Preparation of the Altar involves prayers of thanksgiving to God for the bread and wine, both of which require human labor to produce. They do not occur naturally in nature. So the prayers acknowledge how we take what "earth has given" – grain and grapes – which become what "human hands have made" – bread and wine. This is what God intended: that we apply our work to what He has created, and thus offer it back to God in thanksgiving.

The wine has water added to it as the priest prays silently: "By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity." It's merely symbolic of the two natures of Christ – the water being humanity added to His divinity. When he is pierced on the cross, blood and water pour forth from his side.

Now that the altar is prepared, incense may be used to make holy the sanctuary and to make holy ourselves if the priest and people are incensed as well. The priest washes his hands that will soon hold the Eucharist. He prays silently: "Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin."

All is then ready – bread, wine, altar, congregation and priest – for the next part of the Mass which is most sacred.

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Prayer Changes Things----and People!

The week of Prayer for Christian Unity begins January 18 through the 25th, focusing on prayer & what it does for Christians. It has been said that 'prayer changes things, but it also changes people, especially Christian prayer that folks over the world can relate to. Millions of Americans are expected to join people from other nations for this week of prayer aimed at improved unity among Christians. Such 'National Days of Prayer' are usually held annually since they were instituted in the early 1950s. Those who pray hard and long tell us that 'persistence' is one of the key virtues of successful prayer, simply through regular, steadfast communication with God! The goal is to reach Christ, for the Lord wants us to pray. Prayer is an act of obedience; however, God doesn't need us to assist Him. We pray because God has established prayer as part of His plan to accomplish His will in the world. He will more likely respond to us if we're constant in our efforts to reach Him. God will more likely reply to us if our prayer life is persistent and unchanging. God no doubt regards serious prayer with deeper spiritual value more than if we bombard Him endlessly with the unimportant requests. He doesn't care if K-State beats


We may wonder occasionally as to why our prayers go unanswered? Praying is not like ordering a cheeseburger. With the latter, you tell the waiter what you want, or don't want, & they bring you that ideal cheeseburger. With prayer, you must listen as well as talk. That is true when communicating with God. To answer the opening question of this paragraph----have you considered that 'No Reply' from God concerning your prayer request might just be His Response, saying "I heard you, but I won't do what you ask." Talking with Him means you have to listen as well as talk, for that's what true communication is. He often answers your prayers, but not in the way you seek. The way prayer is answered belongs to God, not to us.

We often hear someone say to us, "I'll pray for you." It's a simple promise and both the giver and the receiver hope that it will make a difference for the one being prayed for. We might say it is a statement of faith. You feel that the individual who told you that 'he will pray for you'---that he will. There's a feeling of trust between the two people. Yet, we know there's only so much we can do, so we should turn in confidence to Our Lord that this promise will be kept. Often, we turn to Him each night with the same request and here is where perseverance comes in. God is patient and hearing the same request nightly, for who knows how long, is characteristic of our prayers to Him. He knows that faithfulness over time shows sincere love. God is happily awaiting our prayers; after all, He is 'our Father' who is anxious to accommodate us & He will respond much more if we are persistent in praying to Him. There may be no good answers in human terms, but we need to trust Jesus' promise that if we ask God for help, He will respond in some way, if only to help us bear our suffering.

America's moral & spiritual crises prompted leaders from some 60 denominations to call for January prayer for Christian Unity so we can all unite in seeking the face of God through prayer. The good news is that if we humble ourselves & turn from wicked ways, as God told Solomon in II Chronicles 7:14, He will heal our land. Do some extra praying between January 18 thru the 25th for all nations, like the Ninevites of old, to cry out to God & seek His face for ourselves & for greater unity among Christians here & throughout the world.

As to the value of prayer, itself, French Cardinal Roger Etchegaray said this: "the human person may surround himself with all the most precious objects, achieve the greatest power, & enjoy all earthly pleasures, but in him, there will always be a void that only God can fill."
