# **Understanding the Mass** (by Father Vacca)

#26 The four Eucharistic Prayers can be likened to the four Gospels. Since the Roman Canon draws upon Matthew's Gospel, the three newer Eucharistic Prayers each draw characteristics from the remaining Gospels.

Eucharistic Prayer #4 presents the whole history of salvation in just a few lines: from Creation and the Fall to Incarnation and Redemption. It beautifully describes how Christ brought good news to the poor, freedom to prisoners, and joy to those in sorrow. And we remember not just the faithful, but "all who seek you with a sincere heart" and "all the dead whose faith You alone have known."

Unfortunately, we don't hear this 4<sup>th</sup> Eucharistic Prayer too often because it has its own preface which can only be used during Ordinary Time and when not celebrating some other saint or feast. This preface recalls the "countless hosts of angels" who serve the Lord "night and day" and how the Lord seeks to bless us with every blessing.

## February: A Short, But Interesting Month

Ten days ago, we left February, known for cold weather, President's Month, and a 'date', Feb. 29th, that plays hide and seek with us, appearing once every four years! This year, 2024, is a 'Leap Year' when an extra day was added to February. You ask why? To trace Leap Year back in history, it gets a bit technical. A calendar year is typically 365 days. These are the number of days it takes the Earth to complete one orbit around the Sun. Let us go back to the year 46 BC when Julius Caesar and his astronomers created the Julian Calendar. They noticed that the old Roman calendar was out of step with the seasons so they introduced 'Leap Year', an idea they acquired from the Egyptians. who were precise with calculations. That figure, 365 days mentioned above, was a rounded off number, but when the astronomers re-figured, they found it to be more like 365.242 days to orbit the Earth around the Sun, or specifically, about 365 days 6 hours. So, to compensate for the lost time (approx. 6hrs), an extra day was added to the calendar in the 4th year. (4 x 6 = 24hrs)

What would happen if we didn't have a Leap Year every 4 years? That 'extra time', those 24 hours would have to be accounted for somehow, otherwise seasons would be affected. After so many years not making up the 'extra 24 hrs.', the seasons would begin to drift. Summers would begin to slip into early fall and Christmas season could end up in the spring as the calendar and delayed seasons met. This could be devastating for farmers who plant in season. The Julian Calendar began to add more 'leap years' than necessary and by 1577 A.D. (anno domini=in the year of Our Lord), scientists found a 10 day discrepancy in the years, so Pope Gregory XIII introduced the Gregorian Calendar in 1582, which is the calendar that we use today. It actually dropped 10 days in October of 1582 that returned the new Gregorian Calendar in tune with the earth's seasons.

To complicate this further, we should add that Leap Years happen almost every 4 years. 2024 and 2028 are listed as Leap Years. There is an exception to this once-every-four-year rule. If we added a Leap Day every 4 years, we'd make the calendar longer by 44 minutes. Over the years, those extra 44 minutes added annually would cause the seasons to gradually move into months that would complicate our lives as we said before. So, a formula was devised to prevent such complications: Years that are easily divided by 100 are NOT leap years, with the exception of years that are evenly divisible by 400 DO have a leap day. 1900 had no leap day, while 2000 did. If you don't get all of this, you are not alone! But, that's the way the Leap Year Day is calculated.

The word, February, was named after the Roman festival of Purification, called FEBRUA, during which people were ritually cleaned. We know that Mary's Purification occurred on February 2, at the time that Jesus was presented in the Temple.

February has been associated with 'the ladies' privilege' for years. The story is about St. Bridget who was unhappy in 5th Century Ireland that women had no chance to propose marriage. She complained about it to St. Patrick and he recommended a change whereby every 7 years, women could take the initiative in proposing marriage. She wore him down to every 4 years, thus we have what Europeans call "The Ladies Privilege" or Leap Year!

I'll close this column with a familiar poem that 'says it all'!

Thirty days hath September April, June, and November, All the rest have thirty-one Save February, she alone Hath twenty-eight, tis fine Til Leap Year makes it 29! ---Marcel Normand
